



### Active Border – Main Features



- Very <u>porous</u>, open but still <u>discernible</u> border, border as an opportunity, as a discursive space
- Generates the <u>feeling of unity</u> (attachment) and at the same time allows communicating/understanding <u>diversity and plurality</u>
- Deters/alleviates polarisation between "us" and "them"
- Constitute cognitive <u>resources for public learning</u>, and for dialog-like dealing with the past
- Strengthens a <u>European</u> (civil/inclusive, positive) identity
- Requires a thick infrastructure of CBC




# WHEN THE FIRST EUROREGION APPEARED?

The origins of cross-border cooperation date back to the period after the Second World War, when it began to develop mainly on the border between Germany and the Netherlands.

In 1958, EUREGIO was founded around Gronau on the German-Dutch border: the first advanced institutional form of cross-border cooperation.






